

Staying Strong: 365 Days A Year Written by: Demi Lovato Published by: Headlines, 2013 320 pages

The book "Staying Strong: 365 Days A Year" is a non-fiction autobiography. It includes Demi's personal thoughts and struggles for a year in her recovery. The purpose of the book is to help people be inspired to recover from their issues and try to grow and be better people.

The book is written much like a journal: from January 1st right up to December 31st, one whole year. Demi opens up to everyone about her own struggles in life. Not only does she talk about her faults and where things have gone wrong but a majority of the book is positive messages, and how to stay strong every day when you feel yourself falling short. The book is very informative. She talks about what it was like to live with eating disorders and addictions in order to help people who may not see that in their own lives and to understand the struggles that people face in the world, even when we don't see it firsthand.

The book is really well written and structured, with the top of each page having a quote or a positive message of some kind, the middle having almost a diary like entry, and at the end of each page containing a goal. I think this is a very effective way of writing and a good way to help the reader understand her life. The reader can see for themselves what Demi is trying to do first hand, as a role model for young people.

I connected with the book really well. I rarely enjoy reading but this was a refreshing one. Demi's openness and honesty with everyone about her faults and the things she's done wrong is inspiring to me. For her to look back and say I'm embarrassed of the things I did then, but I've grown, is a good message for young people growing up to hear. The book is a second chance book for some, but for me it helped me with my anxiety.

All the positive quotes on every single page, combined with a goal for each day, was an intriguing way to go about writing the book. It gives you the opportunity to read the book fast and develop lots of good ideas and messages. You could also read a page a day and try to do each goal daily. This would be a really cool way to read it as every page has a goal for the day.
